

ALTÖTTING Heart of Bavaria

Discovering the heart of Bavaria



Festivities, sights and round trips





A Bavarian saying has it that "from every doorstep, a path leads to Altötting". Each year innumerable pilgrims journey to this national shrine located in Bavaria. Whether pledged to old traditions, moved by deep faith or out of sport-related ambition, everyone treading the paths to Altötting is motivated by the heart. For over 1250 years the town has been the spiritual centre of Bavaria and for more than five centuries it's been the most important Marian pilgrimage site in the German-speaking world. Since the blossoming of pilgrimages here in 1489, an incalculable number of pilgrims have flocked to the Chapel of Grace with its Black Madonna: among them prince-electors, emperors and kings of Bavaria and Austria, as well as three popes.



"Following the Footsteps of Emperors, Kings and Popes"

The history of Altötting is intrinsically linked with both the Wittelsbach and the Habsburg dynasties. Emperors, kings, as well as three popes spent time in Altötting as pilgrims. Since the 17th century the Wittelsbach dukes, prince-electors and kings have had their hearts enshrined in artistically fashioned urns and placed as a princely guard of honour opposite the image of the Black Madonna in Altötting. Among them is the heart of "fairy-tale king" Ludwig II of Bavaria, famous for his impressive castles.



The world-famous Altötting Madonna, the so-called "Black Madonna", is actually at the root of the most important Marian pilgrimage site in German-speaking countries. The 66 cm high statue of Our Lady of Altötting was carved in the early Gothic style in the Upper Rhine region around 1330 and is made from lime tree or coniferous wood.

In her left hand, Mary holds a sceptre with a lily blossom as a sign of her virginity. The Child Jesus rests on her right arm and carries a celestial sphere representing the omnipotence of God. Since the Baroque period, both Our Lady of Altötting and the Child Jesus have worn elaborate crowns adorned with precious stones. These treasures were often donated by female members of the royal Wittelsbach family.

In addition to the natural darkening process of the wood, the Altötting Madonna is blackened by the soot of all the candles lit throughout the centuries and is therefore revered as the "Black Madonna".

Dates, Festivities and Celebrations

The pilgrimage calendar is highlighted by many traditions and festivities such as the first of May, marking the beginning of the Marian month, the impressive Corpus Christi procession and the Feast of the Assumption on August 15th, which is preceded by a solemn procession of lights, the evening before. Above all, the three-day Whitsun celebration marks the arrival of numerous traditional groups of pilgrims, the origins of which go back hundreds of years. This event is bathed in a very special atmosphere. However, worldly customs should not be missing at a pilgrimage site either. Every year, on the weekend following Whitsun, Altötting's court fair takes place, featuring a procession of the breweries' festively decorated, horse-drawn carts. Beer, snacks and Bavarian specialties are among the quintessential draws of this one-week long event held at Dultplatz.

Worth a visit: Museums

The Jerusalem Panorama of Christ's Crucifixion refers to an extensive circular viewing space. The panorama art form was widespread in the 19th century. The classic panorama of Christ's crucifixion from 1903 is the only historical spacious panorama in Germany (the screen area is about 1200 square meters) and today it is a UNESCO listed site. Its creator was Prof. Gebhard Fugel (1863–1939), a doyen of biblical imagery.

 treasury and pilgrimage museum - offers information on the history of Altötting's pilgrimages and precious artistic testimonials of its pilgrimage tradition. Besides the famous "Golden Horse" (a small Marian altar made of gold and enamel, a worldwide unique work of art that experts rank among the most precious art treasures of Europe) or the bridal wreath of Austrian's Empress Elisabeth, known as Sissi, numerous other treasures from many centuries are on display.





At the **Altöttinger Marienwerk** one can view the Diorama Show. Ingeniously illuminated three-dimensional spatial images, more than 5,000 figurines, some of them hand-made, building models, sculptural landscapes and paintings are merged in a total of 22 vivid units showing historic events in the pilgrimage history of Altötting. This unique Altötting work of art bears witness to the unwavering trust that people have placed on Altötting's Mother of Mercy in the past 500 years with all their ups and downs.



The Incense Museum – its fragrance is closely connected to the High Masses celebrated by the church. Many people have experienced its beneficial and pain–relieving effect. At times there is something mystical about incense, and at other times it is just relaxing. The museum is small, but impressive. There are interestingly designed boards with information reaching from the history of incense up to the areas of incense application. Some 3,500 years ago different peoples already recognised the beneficial effect of incense on the body. They discovered that smoke disinfects the air. Incense is also an ingredient of ointments applied on the joints and skin.

Pilgrimage weekend in Altötting

(suggestion)

1st day (Friday)

Individual arrival in Altötting.

Discovery of the pilgrimage town and visit to the local museums (see previous pages).

Dinner in a typical Bavarian beer garden.



2nd day (Saturday)

Breakfast at the hotel.

Guided city tour "Customs and traditions" in English by prior request at the local tourist office (€ 61.00 per group, max. 30 participants).

Tour to the surrounding area in the afternoon, e.g. to Marktl, the birth place of Pope Benedict XVI, or Burghausen with Europe's longest fortress complex and Raitenhaslach Monastery. Dinner at the hotel.

Participation in the candlelight procession of Altötting (from May to October every Saturday evening after evening mass).

3rd day (Sunday)

Breakfast at the hotel.

10.00 am. Attend festive High Mass at the Basilica of St Anne with orchestral mass, followed by individual departure or additional sightseeing in the Inn–Salzach area.



Bavaria's religious centers

The Marian pilgrimage town of Altötting and the Passion Play village of Oberammergau – next performances in 2020 – are among the must–see's of religious places in Bavaria.

Tour suggestion:

Day 1: Welcome in Altötting, the spiritual center of Germany Day 2: Altötting – Marktl – Burghausen – Salzburg – Altötting Day 3: Altötting – Castle at Herrenchiemsee – Oberammergau

Day 4: Wieskirche – Castle Neuschwanstein – Oberammergau

Day 5: Oberammergau - Castle Linderhof - Departure

With this round trip you can combine the most important places in South Bayaria.







Shrines of Europe
